

### EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR LETTER TO THE ASSOCIATION 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT

2020 has been a year that has affected everyone, everywhere because of COVID-19. Most of the time we all have experiences that have a direct impact on our daily life but this COVID-19 season has affected every aspect of life AND ministry throughout the world. In mid-February of this year I was with a team in South Asia. One week after we returned to the US, that nation 'shut down;' and two weeks after that, our nation 'shut down.' The Covid-19 'shut down' has been so extensive that all nations have felt it, resulting in our churches and even SBC-wide halting mission activity, trips, and all travel plans. Normally we have an active mission calendar for our BAGBR churches, a very busy camp schedule at Judson Retreat, our local churches do a full array of summer activities, along with keeping very busy weekly schedules including Sundays. None of these things have been 'normal' since mid-March and to date we are still far from normal...far!!! However, our churches have become innovative, creative, technologically advanced, and re-inventive. Not all of our churches have done as well, but by in large it has been a great encouragement to see so many of our churches 'rise to the occasion' and pastors and staff seeking to stay the course of ministry, evangelism, and cultural engagement in a completely different situation from that which we have all been accustomed.

Just when the COVID-19 situation seemed to be lessening, protests and cultural upheaval began to abound around Memorial Day. No doubt that there was already a level of frustration and anxiety that was latent in our nation over COVID-19, but the death of George Floyd only exacerbated this. Even now, throughout our nation these concerns wedded with political dynamics are keeping this tension at a high level. We must, as a church, keep the main thing the main thing in being faithful to the Gospel because Christ alone is the only way that hearts are profoundly changed, and society can be calmed and restored. Then when things seem to be leveling out in our area with the above mentioned, Hurricane Laura arrived on August 25/26 and devastated the west side of Louisiana, with Lake Charles and Deridder taking the worst of it. Since its land fall and subsequent sweeping northward in our state, we have been in full disaster relief mode. Many of our churches have mobilized to help our fellow churches and Louisiana citizens who have been affected. BAGBR has been involved daily with sending teams, equipment, resources and personnel to help in the initial relief work. Because of the extensive damage and the widespread impact of the hurricane, this work will be going on for many months. So, if some have not been able to be involved to date...and desire to do so; let us know. We can get you plugged in!!! (And then came Hurricane Delta)

I think of that statement that Mordecai gave Esther as she was contemplating what her speaking to the king may cost her, "And who knows...for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14) He reminded her that God had been the one who promoted her, given her favor to be queen and that now that she 'was' in this position, she must act with great courage and resolve to fulfill her calling. These

days that we are living in are without a doubt challenging but God has put us here, placed in the positions that we occupy, given us the influence and resources that we have in order that we fulfill His purposes for THIS time. Although these may not be the best of times in one sense, we as God's people must be our BEST in these times. Rather than complain about our difficulties, every generation has them, let us resolve to obey God in these days. Let us find even better ways to make Him known and share our faith. The altering of our church schedule so meeting together has been a challenge which has frustrated us because we cannot 'have church' like we would like. May we, in such an environment, allow God to show us not How we can 'have' church but How we can better BE the Church.

On a personal note, thank you BAGBR churches for your unfailing and unflagging support throughout this entire year. I count it a great joy and privilege to serve our Lord and serve the great churches of the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge.

#### **Senior Adults**

The Senior Adult Ministry hosted its annual Senior Adult Revival in September 2019. Reverend Gary Bolin was the evangelist this year while the host churches provided the worship leaders for each day's revival. Florida Boulevard Baptist and FBC Baton Rouge hosted the meetings. We averaged nearly 200 each day. Churches are continuing to provide some great programs for senior adults. Again, we encourage churches to network in order to provide seniors with expanded opportunities.

#### **Evangelism**

Personal evangelism is still the most effective way to reach the world with the gospel. It is only the church mobilized that has a chance to reach their neighborhoods and their cities. The Association continues to offer evangelism training to all of our churches. We offer options that include one day seminars through seven-week training sessions. Call the association office to schedule your training.

#### Social Issues and Political Action

Louisiana will continue to face significant issues that will have an impact on the church and Christian communities. This year we saw a major victory because of the involvement of our churches and pastors. We still need pastors and members to stand up when the need arises to address these issues. Churches must remain vigilant so that our voices can be heard. Once again, we encourage the creation of a cultural impact team (CIT). The CIT focuses on the issues that are being addressed at all levels of government and informs their pastors and church members so that they may call the representatives, senators, or council members to encourage them to vote in a manner that upholds Christian values. Many politicians have said how influential these contacts are in determining their vote.

#### ASSOCIATIONAL COMPASSION MISSIONARY 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT

Whatever day we pick to emphasize is irrelevant to the needs and opportunities that are always present for us as the body of Christ. We must go into the community and provide avenues to engage and share the love and truth of Christ with people in our communities. We are working on having some online training from the LBC that is called "Bridges Out of Poverty." This may be offered in a gathering but will definitely be offered live through virtual opportunities.

#### ACADIAN BAPTIST CENTER 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT

2020 will go down as a pivotal year in the history of Acadian Baptist Center and much of Louisiana. The first three months of the year went along fairly normal with retreats about every weekend and camp and retreat revenue up about 26%. At the end of March, the pandemic hit and our retreats and camps began canceling. As of now ABC is 84% down in camp and retreat revenue or \$650,000. We cut expenses as much as possible but as time progressed, we had to lay off everyone except for 4 employees and these took pay cuts. Volunteers helped to keep up with grass cutting and repairs. Many churches, associations, and individuals have sent extra donations to help fill the gap. Unrestricted donations are up 170% or \$105,683! The PPP loan program in April helped us to get by a few months. Even though we had no overnight camps this summer and no weekend retreats since the middle of March we had one week of day camp. Several churches in the area helped us put it on and we had at least three (3) salvations!

Another landmark event this year has been the completion of a beautiful new worship center! Joey West as contractor and Brodie Ardoin as architect teamed up to complete the most beautiful spacious setting for worship in our area. Seating close to 1000 with state-of-the-art sound and lighting it was ready in May for the summer camps that never came. The worship center was christened in August by a powerful ecumenical men's conference filled with testimonies from local pastors and businessmen. Encompassing close to 18,000 square feet and costing over \$3 million with furnishings. We look forward to God using it for many years to come. Our Legacy of Worship campaign was a big success even though it was cut short by the onset of the pandemic. Raising over \$2 million with 245 different donors, God has worked in miraculous ways. However, with the loss of business the debt comes at a difficult time and we solicit your prayers to help us pay off the worship center debt of over \$1 million as soon as possible. It is exciting watching pledges and donations come in regularly.

Hurricane Laura is the third big event so far this year! We had minor damage and lost power a few days. The night of the storm three different fire departments from Iowa and the surrounding areas and their families and fire trucks sheltered here. As soon as it was safe, they cut trees blocking the highway to go back and rescue people. Members of the Cajun Navy including their leader Jon Bridgers stayed here and told us heartbreaking stories of rescuing people and the devastation in the Lake Charles area. Many evacuees came and are still here driving back and forth to work on clean up and repairs. Mission teams from all over the country have been staying here helping in the cleanup. Seventy-five Entergy workers from Arkansas and Mississippi have been here two weeks doing repairs in the Iowa area. They were driving back and forth from New Orleans to Lake Charles when one of the linemen found out about ABC from his pastor. Cleco contractors were here a few days as well as Red Cross volunteers doing assessment work across south west Louisiana. The damage everyone reports is the worst they have seen and very widespread.

Even though these are uncertain times, we stand on Romans 8:28 that all things work together for the good to those that love God and are called according to His service. We are hoping that retreats will start again as we continue ministering to the storm victims. We are planning our Wild Game Dinner October 6 and Matt Heggs the UL baseball coach will share his testimony. Saturday, October 10 at 2pm we are planning a dedication service for our new worship center. We continue working and planning for our camps and retreats next summer.

# BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY - LOUISIANA STATE UNIVERSITY 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT Steve Masters, Director

Our BCM has had to adjust our ministry due to the coronavirus. LSU requires us to secure permission for any meeting, event, or trip including ten students or more. LSU only allows us to have a maximum of 50 students in a room for a meeting. We have adjusted to these rules and are having an excellent semester of ministry.

#### We exist to:

- 1. Reach students for Christ
- 2. Connect students to a local church
- 3. Strengthen students in their faith
- 4. Mobilize students for missions and leadership

The following are reports about specific ministry areas.


- 1. <u>TNT Worship-</u> Held each Thursday at 7:00pm during the Spring Semester of 2020. For the Fall Semester we are sponsoring our TNT each Thursday night at 6:00pm and at 7:30pm, due to the coronavirus we have a maximum of fifty students that can attend.
- 2. <u>Family Group Bible Studies-</u> We are sponsoring nine of them that include nearly 100 students. Our collegiate churches are sponsoring college bible studies that are involving nearly 100 students.
- 3. <u>Freshmen Night-</u> Held each Monday night at 5:00pm. The purposes of this night are to help freshmen connect with each other, develop as leaders, and to serve The Lord. Over 60 freshmen have attended this fall.
- 4. <u>International Student Ministry-</u> After the coronavirus began in March our BCM began providing Food To-Go Boxes to International Students. We have provided food to over 200 different International Students. This semester we provided the food boxes at 6:30pm on Monday nights. Over \$30,000 worth of food has been provided. A special thanks to our local churches, alumni, parents, and other interested individuals for providing food or a financial contribution to purchase food.

We sponsor an International Student Dinner each Monday night at 5:30pm. At the dinner we have a three-week rotation. Week one is game night, we play and teach games with the students. Week two is culture night, students share about their country. We share cultural topics such as holidays, geography, etc. Week three is our spiritual night, we share the Gospel.

5. <u>Mission Arlington-</u> Over fifty students participated in our mission trip to Mission Arlington in December of 2019. We have been approved by LSU to go on this trip in December of 2020. We receive food, clothing, and furniture from individuals and then provide it to those in need in Arlington.


- 6. <u>Mexico Mission Trip-</u> We had to cancel our mission trip to Mexico in the spring of 2020 due to violence in the area and the coronavirus. We hope to be able to go back in March of 2021.
- 7. Ski Trip- Over thirty of our BCM students participated in our Ski Trip in January of 2020. We are going back to Winter Park, Colorado in January of 2021. We already have over thirty students signed up.
- 8. <u>Leadership Team-</u> Fifty students are serving as our BCM Leadership Team that plans, coordinates, and implements our BCM ministry.


## BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY - NICHOLLS STATE UNIVERSITY 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT Conan Sherlin, Director

The last school year was a great year for the ministry at Nicholls State University, but in vastly different means. The first part of the year (Fall 2019) saw more traditional ministry efforts. The BCM served a dozen lunches on campus, which gave hundreds of students the chance to meet local churches and connect with their ministers. We featured several outreach dinners with different campus organizations targeted, from sports teams to Greek life. These dinners resulted in many non-traditional BCM students hearing testimonies of God's redeeming love. The BCM also hosted weekly Bible studies with live music and speakers all working to achieve Paul's mandate in Colossians 1:28.



The BCM also spent countless hours out on campus practicing evangelism. God used these efforts to see lives transformed, Thank God! The BCM also continued in our Gospel Appointment methodology, in which we make an appointment to share the Gospel with every single visitor to our ministry center. This focus has also done wonders in teaching our students about being vocal with their faith and giving them practical experience sharing this necessary message. We had a dozen students sign up for our Spring Break Mission Trip! We were all set to serve in the Bahamas, helping those churches damaged by a recent hurricane. We even had half a dozen students already signed up for Summer Missions through the IMB!! What an exciting time! Then, as I am sure most of you remember, Covid-19 hit. We were in the process of hosting a Virginia BCM team down to work with us when news started coming out. Less than a week later, everyone was going home.

The Spring semester saw us continuing our efforts, but mostly over digital means. We still hosted Bible Studies and community building events through Zoom and gaming platforms. This was a difficult time for all involved, especially as the BCM dealt with the tragedy of death amongst our members. The good news is, we are back now, with limited face to face contact. We are still figuring out what this will look like and how we will proceed, but rest assured, as long as we are here, we will continue our effort to impact students with the Gospel and providing them a platform to grow with!



We are so thankful for the support of this association in reaching the lost at Nicholls. We could not do what we do without the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge. The coming year we are excited about the new crop of freshmen coming in, while lamenting the excellent group of seniors we are sending back out to local congregations, more fully equipped. # BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY – SOUTHERN UNIVERSITY 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT Michael Aguillard Jr., Director

We exist to reach, teach, serve, and send out Southern University Baton Rouge students with a clear understanding of the gospel and His activity in their lives. Our goal is to produce lifelong disciple-makers.

- 1. We accomplish this goal by having an interactive weekly bible study. We are currently meeting weekly on Zoom at 6 p.m. on Tuesday nights. We hope to return to meeting in person on campus as soon as restrictions allow.
- 2. We also meet in smaller groups at a local coffee shop and have been learning how to have a quiet time while studying the Gospel.
- 3. Due to Covid-19 and subsequent restrictions, we have been limited in our ability to do organized events, but some students have begun to do more evangelism in their personal lives.

Though several of our students did not return to campus this semester due to Covid-19, we have 14 students that have been active in our weekly gatherings and discipleship time. Southern has implemented strict guidelines for student organizations to follow due to Covid-19, so we have been limited regarding what we can do and plan for this year. If restrictions are lifted in the Spring, we are hoping to participate in some community service projects and potentially mission trips in partnership with the LSU BCM. In the summer, if restrictions allow, students will have the opportunity to serve in local churches during Vacation Bible Schools.

Church multiplication - which includes new church plants, church revitalization/replants, and multi-site campuses - is a biblically faithful, practically strategic, and time-tested means of obeying God's call on all Christians to "go and make disciples of all nations." Our Church Multiplication Team - which includes both seasoned BAGBR pastors as well as several current church planters - desires to see this conviction take root deep in the hearts of every pastor, leader, and church member within our association. We aim to raise awareness of the need for multiplication, facilitate meaningful connections between existing churches and new works, and equip every church to partner in this work of God in a tangible way through praying, giving, mentoring, resourcing, and the like. We are excited at the possibilities on the horizon for Kingdom advancement in our area and we want everyone to be a part.

We have a stated goal of seeing 70 works within the above definition of church multiplication by the end of 2022. Since this goal was initially set in 2012, we have seen 32 new works of multiplication, with several other promising works on the near horizon. # JUDSON BAPTIST RETREAT CENTER 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT Justin Busby, Coordinator

Our Mission is to raise up a generation, passionate for Jesus Christ, by providing opportunities for life changing experiences."

The Year that Could Have Been, and the Year that was - The 2019-2020 year has been one that will not be quickly forgotten. Judson Retreat as plugging along nicely through the fall and into the winter months, but life as we knew it came to a screeching halt in mid-March. But even in the circumstances like we have all faced with this pandemic, God has proven Himself to be more than enough. It has not been EASY, but God does not call us to EASY. He calls us to RIGHTEOUSNESS. This is a truth that we constantly put before our staff as we struggled to grasp the realities of what the pandemic meant for the camp and retreat ministries at Judson Retreat Center. Like many small businesses and ministries, the cancelation of retreat groups and summer camps through the Spring and Summer led to financial difficulties for Judson Retreat. We were forced to cut the hours of our permanent part-time staff and many of our part-time hourly staff who worked in food service and housekeeping saw their hours diminish greatly. Thankfully, the Association applied for the Payroll Protection Plan Loan/Grant, which provided some relief for keeping our employees working. We even had a local church who came alongside us and covered 2 weeks of our payroll for our essential staff.

The core staff at Judson began to meet and pray about what we should be doing as we moved through the mandated shutdown. Through these meetings we asked for God's wisdom and guidance on how to proceed. We began to pray for area churches who we knew were struggling, we began to make plans for what the summer might look like, we saw this as an opportunity to do some new things going forward, and we saw this as an opportunity to create a vision and long range plan for Judson Retreat Center. We knew what we were not allowed to do during the pandemic, but we set out to determine what we could do.

Summer Camp Program - Our summer camp program was shut down by the mandates of our Governor, camps could not host overnight groups. So, we began to look and see what was allowed, and day camps were allowable. We followed the guidelines and regulations and began to plan what the summer could look like following those rules. The result was Judson Retreat's Traveling Day Camp. We developed a plan to take camp on the road, complete with Bible Study, Missions Study, Water Recreation, Gaga ball tournaments and even Horse Back Riding. Over the Summer of 2020 we travel over 1200 miles, partnered with 17 churches to host 15-day camps in 8 Parishes ministering to over 430 people. Our theme for the summer was "It's All Good", based on Genesis 50:20 which reads, "You intended to harm me, but God intended it all for good. He brought me to this position so I could save the lives of many people." Our Bible Study was the story of Joseph and how even through difficulties and despair, God took him from the pit, to Potiphar's house, to prison and to the palace. Even when it seemed hard, God was at work. Praise the Lord, for He is working for our good and His glory even in the midst of this pandemic.

It was amazing to see God's hand at work during the day camps this summer. For many kids, the day camps were the first time they had been able to see friends, venture outside their own yards, or fellowship with other believers. It was such a humbling experience to join God in such a special ministry. The Lord even put together just the right staff for the summer. They were so very flexible and willing to serve. They loved on kids (socially distanced of course), taught them Biblical truth during this trying time, and shared the gospel. This summer was vastly different for all of us, but at the same time this summer was amazing. In the summer of 2019 Judson Retreat had about 450 campers and volunteer counselors come to our programed camps, and even in the midst of the global pandemic, God allowed us to impact and minster to over 430 in the summer of 2020. We look forward to having a more normal summer in 2021 and are excited to see what God is going to do going forward.

The Forge Discipleship Institute - One of the new endeavors at Judson during the summer of 2020 was the Forge Discipleship Institute pilot program. Justin "Buzz" Busby, the manager at Judson, came to camp ministry after 16 years of BCM ministry, and has a real passion for discipleship. The Forge Discipleship Institute was a vision that God laid on his heart two years before coming to Judson Retreat. Its purpose it to train and equip the future leaders of the church, through in-depth discipleship, sound theological training, character and leadership development, practical ministry training and mission opportunities. Over the summer of 2020 the thirteen-summer staff went through a shortened but intensive pilot program of the Forge.

Over the 10 weeks that the staff was at the Retreat Center, they studied 25 core foundational truths of the Christian faith, learning not only what we believe but also why we believe it. They were able to explore and understand their natural leadership styles and discovered their spiritual gifts and how God uses them to fulfill His ministry. They studied through the book of Romans, grasping the richness of the theological truths found in the word. They learned the importance of accountable relationships and the biblical mandate to be accountable to other believers. They even read through three books together and discussed them in weekly small group meetings. The Forge program also brought in four different catalyst speakers, who shared with the staff through God's word. They focused on the concepts of discipleship, trusting God and the importance of a Biblical world view. It was so much fun to watch the light bulbs going off as the staff began to grasp concepts of faith and truth and make them their own. It was even more fun to watch them take all that they were learning and put it into practice through our summer day camps.

It is our hope and goal to build off this pilot program and offer the Forge Discipleship Institute as a year-round opportunity for 18-25-year old's. So many college students throw money and years down the drain trying to figure out what to do with their lives. We want to offer them a year where they can seek what God wants them to do with their lives, where they can be grounded in the Word, invested in, equipped to make disciples and then launched into the world to live missional lives.

Fall and Spring Retreats - From August of 2019 to March of 2020 we hosted 22 rental groups. We had quilters, college groups, ladies groups, high school groups, middle school groups, Hispanic groups, prison ministry groups and many, many others. We ministered to Baptist, Methodist, Catholics and more, and we even programed our fall and spring Mother/Daughter horse weekends, our Fall Family Fun Day and a Widows Retreat. It was a wonderful year of people resting, retreating and knowing that He is God. Sadly, we also had to cancel 21 retreats, 5 summer rental camps, and our annual Campers on Mission group this year because of the pandemic.

**2020 - The Year of the Broken -** In a normal year in the camp and retreat setting we have lots of things that break, it is a common occurrence. But in a normal year we have revenue coming in from summer camps and retreats to cover those expenses. This year we have had several bigticket items that have broken and are in need of replacement or repair, and not much in the coffers to make those purchases or repairs. *Please be in prayer* for those needs as we begin the process of ramping back up to reopening to groups, and if you or your church feel led to help, please call the camp office to see how your gifts and abilities might match our needs.


The Lord Does Provide - For the year 2020 revenue is down almost 80% at the retreat center. But the Lord is faithful and so are those who love Judson. We are so blessed to have people who love Judson and wanted to help during this trying time. We were able to house and feed our summer staff this summer because we had individuals and churches who pledged and gave almost \$16,000. Of the camp deposits and fees that were paid to the camp prior to the shutdown, almost \$10,000 were turned into donations for the Retreat Center. The Judson Retreat Traveling Day Camps were done at no charge to the churches or kids who attended, but the churches and families who attended donated over \$12,000 to the camp. And other general donations totaling over \$20,000 have come in to help keep the camp viable. As we move forward into the fall of 2020, we are trusting God to continue to provide our everyday needs such as payroll, utilities, insurances and other miscellaneous expense. (Philippians 4:19)

#### A word from Judson's Camp Director, Justin Busby-

At the first of the year, Judson boasted a full calendar of retreats and summer camps. **Then came COVID.** The global pandemic brought life as we knew it to a crashing halt. Convinced God had a plan, our staff prayed for creative ways to do ministry. The Lord graciously allowed us to host traveling day camps at local churches and to meaningfully invest in our summer staff. His provision convinced us even more deeply that He has a plan for significant ministry at Judson Retreat Center—well into the future. Despite that positive vision, the pandemic has not left us unscathed.

#### We are currently operating at below 25% of our regular annual revenue.

This reality not only limits any new facility development, but directly affects our ability to cover payroll, utilities and the cost of regular property maintenance issues. Several of these issues must be resolved before we can consider hosting larger retreat groups:

- a new compressor unit for the kitchen walk-in cooler
- at least two new air conditioner units
- major roof repair on Sleepy Hollow cabin
- repair or replace the kitchen generator
- a lift station at the sewage lagoons

We believe that God's hand is still on our Retreat Center and we invite you to partner with us as we follow His guidance and step into the future. The vision God has cast for us includes serving as a hub for discipleship as we train staff who serve our campers and retreat groups, developing more programmed camp and retreat opportunities for our local churches, and providing helpful resources for retreat groups.

Would you prayerfully consider how God might have you participate through this special giving opportunity? This will help move our Retreat Center into its next phase of service to the body of Christ in Louisiana.

# LCIW - LOUISIANA CORRECTIONAL INSTITUTE FOR WOMEN CHAPEL VOLUNTEER REPORT Debi Sharkey, Chaplain & Volunteer Coordinator 2019-2020 Report

The LCIW Chaplain's Department consists of two staff Chaplains, (one full time and one-part time), along with 9 part-time Volunteer Chaplains and a volunteer Assistant Volunteer Services Coordinator. The senior Chaplain, Dr. Sharkey, also serves as the Volunteer Coordinator. The Volunteer Chaplains contributed 2321 hours of personal time providing administrative support and pastoral care while making 4928 offender contacts.

Volunteers continue to be the backbone of faith-based programs and represent the chief resource available to the Chaplain's Department at the LCIW. Without the support of volunteers, it would be impossible for chaplains to provide for the spiritual needs of offenders and effectively promote rehabilitation, spiritual growth and emotional health. During the 2019-20 year, we facilitated the DOC training of over 657 individuals; 361 of those trained individuals are currently volunteering at LCIW.

The LCIW volunteers contributed approximately 2022 hours. Volunteers offer recovery, rehabilitation, hope, healing, and restoration of relationships to offenders through 43 different programs and/or ministries. Ministries and Programs include but are not limited to the following: recovery programs, worship services, Bible studies, faith-based college-level classes, pastoral care, grief recovery, individual and group counseling, CTRP Programs, counseling, new commits orientation and ministry to offenders in lockdown, the Infirmary and Assisted Living areas. These ministries and programs resulted in a cumulative total of 19,229 offender hours.

Volunteers also distributed religious materials and personal hygiene products through the Chapel totaling 726 boxes. Boxes consisted of products such as soap, deodorant, lotion, shampoo, toothbrushes, toothpaste, pens, devotionals and socks. In addition, holiday greeting cards and a variety of gifts were donated to offenders through the chapel.

The Chapel staff and volunteers continue to provide services and activities at both the JCCY and EHCC locations. The staff also provides pastoral support to the offenders housed at LSP. In addition to existing on-going ministries implemented Life of a Single Mom, Onesimus and The Reading Connection this year.

**Peer Ministers:** This Volunteer Report would be incomplete without the inclusion of the efforts demonstrated by Peer Ministers. Peer Ministers are offenders who have proven to be dependable, honest, hard-working people of character, equipped and willing to use their skills to minister to their fellow peers. Peer ministers led Bible studies, worship services, recovery groups, Creative arts groups, ministries to seniors and moms, and many other various programs and ministries. Peer Ministers had 4118 contacts through their Infirmary and dorm rounds. They conducted over 677 services and small groups.

#### Additional Accomplishments and Events

- On September 27–30, 2019, the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge held the Annual Ladies Day & Revival. Under the direction of Janie Wise, the Baptist women throughout the state worked together to donate and distribute 558 personal supply boxes to all offenders at Hunt, LSP and JCCY; and donated approximately 300 more to be given to new commits upon their arrival at LCIW. They provided the Saturday lunch meal for both JCCY and EHCC offenders. They hosted services under the tent, including a baptism service on Sunday.
- Kairos held retreats in October at JCCY 2019.
- The Annual Faith Based Ministry Dinner took place at JCCY in November 2019 and in December 2019 for EHCC offenders.
- The annual Celebrate Recovery Graduation took place in August 2019. NOBTS held a small graduation for 1 graduate. The event had JCCY and EHCC offenders.
- Special services were held for Thanksgiving, Christmas, and Ash Wednesday.
- The Chapel was in charge of the annual Children's Christmas Extravaganza in December.
- Every child in attendance was given a Christmas gift. In addition, the faith-based groups provided a generous donation of gift bags and candy for the Easter Extravaganza.
- The chapel distributed Christmas cards and Mother's Day cards to each offender at JCCY, EHCC, and LSP.
- In December, all offenders at JCCY, LSP and EHCC received a pair of fuzzy socks, 3 candy canes, 2 microwave plates and a shower cap. Donors also provided funds to deposit \$25 into each offender's drawing account.
- There were 65 one-on-one faith-based reentry consultations by the staff chaplains.
- During the COVID-19 pandemic, we coordinated a hot meal for all staff members and
- security officers on all shifts at JCY and EHCC.
- Each offender received a prayer journal and ink pen donated by volunteers. In addition, faith-based groups donated funds to deposit a little over \$10 into each offender's drawing account at JCCY, EHCC and LSP.

# NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY THE JOAN HORNER CENTER, NOBTS ~ LSP, ANGOLA, LA 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT Rick Sharkey, Director LSP NOBTS

This year has been challenging because of the COVID-19 pandemic. It has effected all of the prison populations in the state. In Angola, the Bible College has been closed since the middle of March. The Spring 20' semester was in the 11<sup>th</sup> week of class. The students had just finished their Mid-term exams and assignments. When the school reopens the plan is to do a couple weeks of review and continue the classes where they left off. It may realistically be January 2021 before we can begin the class schedule again.

One monumental development in the program was the beginning of the Master of Divinity program. Last year there were 24 men who graduated with the Master of Arts in Pastoral Ministry (MAPM). Those men and 21 others were added to the MDiv program. It was launched in the Spring of 2020. This is an exciting development in the preparation of men for ministry through the local Angola churches. They are looking forward to continuing their studies.

The current undergrad program has 78 students. About half of them will graduate after the interrupted semester is completed. They were so close to graduation before the pandemic arrived. There is a commencement service planned for May 2021.

God continues to bless the Bible College with faculty that have the best of scholarship and practical pastoral ministry preparation. They are all very excited to begin their classes again.

The pandemic has put the Bible College graduates on the "center stage" of ministry. There have been no volunteer services, no church services, and no group meetings of any kind in the prison. But the graduates, students and church members who live in community throughout the prison have been conducting Bible studies, prayer meetings and yard preaching services on a continual basis. There are reports of God's blessings among the prison population.

Thank you for your prayers and support of the work of the gospel at Angola. Together God is making a great impact. One such blessing is that recently there have been several men to be released from prison. Three of our Bible College graduates have been hired by the Mississippi Department of Corrections to be Chaplains at the Mississippi State Penitentiary at Parchman, MS.

God is so good.

#### PRISON MINISTRY REPORT 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT

Prior to COVID-19 BAGBR had dedicated volunteers facilitating bible studies in the following facilities but in March that came to a halt. The volunteers had 'no' contact with the offenders. But during the pandemic, God made a way for one volunteer to send a monthly devotion and prayer of encouragement offenders through the prison main office. Another was allowed to email bible study information to help the study group of offenders stay connected through the word of God. While they have not been able to facilitate the studies, they continue in prayer for the offenders as they look forward to returning to the prisons.

Please pray for this ministry as we continue to serve the incarcerated so that each will develop true freedom in his/her heart. Pray for the volunteers who will return to this mission field as the DOC allows and for the offenders in the following facilities:

- Louisiana Correctional Institute for Women (LCIW), Baker / St. Gabriel / Angola On September 27-30, 2019, BAGBR held the Annual Revival and Ladies Day. September 2020, due to COVID-19 the annual revival was canceled, but we received a report that when the peer ministers heard about the cancelation, they planned a special service for the offenders. The facility allowed delivery of the 999 gift boxes (soap, socks, shampoo a total of 8 items) provided by Louisiana Baptists from around the state. Thank you Janie Wise, for mobilizing the Louisiana churches to provide these basic needs for the women in our prisons, as well as new commits. In addition, Dick DeBusk, Richard Pilgrim and Blake Futch were allowed to cook the chicken and sausage for the bar-b-que lunch. Thank you for your donations that funded the ingredients for the lunch for these ladies, staff and security at LCIW.

March Covid-19 lock down forced us to re-evaluate how to best minister. At first the seafarers were limited to their ship, we could not go on board. Telephone calls, Facebook and Instant messenger were our only avenues of contact. Soon we learned from our Seafarer Centers around the world that we could shop for the seafarers and bring the items to the gangways. This enabled us to speak face to face again. Later we allowed the seafarers to shop online and have items sent to the center where we would hold and bring their packages to the ship on their next visit. In the last few months, we have been able to make more ship visits than in previous years. Therefore, the statistics below represent the first 4 months (Sept.-Dec.).
- We are amazed to see how our Lord in His sovereignty brings thousands of men and women seafarers from the far away "Ends of the Earth" right here to our local Mississippi River ports! Where else can you do foreign missions and sleep in your own bed every night? We continue to sow seeds of Christ's gospel to seafarers and port workers. Pray for those seeds to be watered and harvested through the power of the Holy Spirit.
- Pray for more beloved saints to answer the call to partner with this Ministry. (Romans 1:16; Matthew 24:14; 46; 28:18-20; Acts 1:8).
- Pray with us for holy living, Godly wisdom, Christ's compassion, Spirit-led gospel witnessing to be exemplified.

# Administrative Council History Hooper Road Baptist Church Property Resolution to Transfer Property to In His Hands Baptist Church

The property formerly known as Hooper Road Baptist Church at 8767 Governor Claiborne Drive in Baton Rouge (near the intersection of Hooper Road and Mickens Road) was given to the Baptist Association in 2010 when Hooper Road Baptist Church dissolved and transferred its property to BAGBR. Before the building on the property could be used by a new church plant, repairs needed to be made.

In 2011, In His Hands Baptist Mission, a new church plant sponsored by Community Bible Baptist was looking for a new place to meet. After discussion with Community Bible Baptist and the Association, an agreement was reached and on February 4, 2012 and In His Hands was allowed to begin repairs on the roof and other areas of the church building. In His Hands proved itself to be up to the challenge and began the task to refurbish the property along with some very generous individuals who gave of their time and money. The Dedication and Installation Service of the church was held on May 6, 2012. Since then In His Hands Baptist has become a vital part of that community in Governor Claiborne Drive area.

Last year at the BAGBR Annual Meeting, having moved from mission to church status, In His Hands Baptist Church was presented to the association for membership into the association at the recommendation of the Petitionary Letters and the Administrative Council. They were unanimously approved.

**Resolution:** We the Administrative Council, recognizing that In His Hands Baptist Church has become a cooperating member through their participation and giving to the Baptist Association of Greater Baton Rouge, moves that the property at 8767 Governor Claiborne Drive, Baton Rouge, Louisiana 70811 be donated to In His Hands Baptist Church and that Executive Director be authorized to sign all the transfer documents.

# STATE MISSIONS SERVICES FOR CHURCHES AND ASSOCIATIONS

#### EXECUTIVE TEAM

Dr. Steve Horn, Executive Director

Following the adjournment of the Annual Meeting in November, the work of our convention of churches continues via the Executive Board of the Louisiana Baptist Convention and the State Missions Services staff. One of the roles of the Executive Team is to ensure the directives expressed and approved by the messengers are carried out. This is accomplished in the following ways.

#### Accountability

The Executive Team coordinates the broad efforts of the State Mission Services staff. Assignments and strategies are delegated to one of seven teams. Each team has provided a report for your review, which is part of the accountability process.

In this unusual year of a pandemic, much of our regular work came to a halt and our efforts centered on consolidating information from various government agencies and making this information easily accessible to churches. In addition to connecting churches to current information and practices, our State Mission Services staff reached out to pastors and AMS's by making approximately 4,000 phone calls to offer assistance, a listening ear, and prayer.

The Executive Team also oversees the personnel and budgets of the State Missions Services staff. The last several years have seen reductions in budgets and personnel; however, the staff continues to operate efficiently and are good stewards of the funds provided by Louisiana Baptists.

The Executive Director works with the elected LBC President to coordinate the planning and execution of the Annual Meeting. He also works with the elected Executive Board President to plan and coordinate Executive Board meetings which are held in September, May, and November.

Publications including the Book of Reports and Annuals are generated by the Executive Team and distributed via public meetings and/or made available online via our website, LouisianaBaptists.org.

The Office of Public Policy falls under the purview of the Executive Team. Dr. Will Hall, Editor of the Baptist Message, provides leadership in this area on behalf of Louisiana Baptists. His report is included below.


#### Presence

The Executive Director serves as an ex-officio member of the Board of Trustees for every Louisiana Baptist entity and regularly attends their scheduled meetings.

Associational Mission Strategists (formerly Directors of Missions) are key partners in our cooperative structure. The Executive Director participates in regular communications with these partners and hosts periodic meetings to enhance communication and coordination of shared ministries. The COVID-19 pandemic provided the opportunity to enhance these relationships as everyone attempted to interpret and navigate the various regulations and phases outlined by the governor and other officials. The Executive Director participated in over a dozen ZOOM meetings with AMS's this year.

The Executive Director also provides a presence for Louisiana Baptists during various meetings of SBC entities and frequently serves on SBC committees and boards. He participates in ongoing dialogue with each of the SBC entity presidents/executive directors, is part of a fellowship with other State Convention Executive Directors and remains in close contact and fellowship with the State Convention Executive Directors of the Southern states.

One of the most important functions of the Executive Director is to represent the larger Louisiana Baptist family to local congregations. Invitations to speak during regular services and special events are welcomed and will be accepted as schedules permit.

#### **BUSINESS AND INFORMATION SERVICES TEAM**

Dale D. Lingenfelter, Director

The Business and Information Services Team serves as a support group for all the work of the LBC State Missions Services. The team provides expertise in the areas of financial accounting, information technology, facilities maintenance, office services, and human resources. Our goal is to enhance and support the work of all LBC Teams so they accomplish the missions and ministry goals of the Convention.

In addition to coordinating the Annual Church Profile (ACP) process for the state, Shana Johnson serves as **Information Services** Support Manager and is responsible for the overall information technical support systems of the Convention and several state entities that are housed within the Baptist Building. In cooperation with other SBC state conventions and national SBC entities, Information Services has been instrumental in developing an on-line database of all SBC congregations and leadership. This program has become the national database for all SBC congregations and all SBC entities, both state and national. The database consists of all information collected through the ACP each year, as well as information directly communicated to the office. All information is retained so as to maintain historical statistical and leadership information for each reporting congregation. Through her team's effort along with assistance from the entire State Mission Service Staff, ACP reporting of all Louisiana Baptist congregations maintains an above average reporting percentage within the SBC network of congregations.

The LBC Accounting Team provides competent tax and accounting information to Louisiana Baptist Churches. It is more likely than not that your church secretary has contacted us with questions on Budgeting, Accounting, Payroll Taxes, and Church Accounting issues. We are here to help you! Our contact information can be found on the LBC website. In addition, consistent with prior years, the Louisiana Baptist Convention received an excellent review on our Annual Audit Report.

Tall Timbers experienced its greatest summer camp attendance in 2019 and greatest number of decisions made for Christ. Director, Josh Bumgardner, and his staff want you to consider summer camp or scheduling a retreat if you have not done so recently. With one floor of hotel renovations completed, our adult accommodations are upgrading with more rooms to follow. A cabin renovation with a different layout was completed in 2019, and another cabin upgrade has begun, which will add another 40 bed spaces to our capacity. There are more improvements and additions currently being planned at Tall Timbers as summer camps and annual attendance continues to grow. With improvements to our facilities, we hope even more to remove distractions as we serve our guests so that they may grow closer to Christ. We provide everything from conference room set ups and meals to activities or teambuilding for youth. We encourage you to register for a summer camp, attend a Louisiana Baptist event here, or program your own retreat at Tall Timbers.

The Business and Information Services Team considers all of its various areas of support work as ministry unto the Lord. We count it a privilege to serve our Lord by serving our colleagues and Louisiana Baptists in the work of reaching Louisiana for Christ and strengthening our churches.

#### **BAPTIST COLLEGIATE MINISTRY**

It is sometimes difficult to remember how ministry operated before the pandemic of 2020. BCM had another incredible year of outreach in 2019 with every campus ministry strong. Soon after our incredible Collegiate Evangelism Conference on February 14-15 held at Louisiana College our work suddenly shifted. All our campus ministers were well versed in utilization of Zoom and Facebook live formats for digital communication before the quarantine began. So, consequentially we made the transition to meeting virtually with students. A good example is Nicholls State BCM. They reported a 100 percent transfer from in person discipleship groups to virtual. I attended many meetings of students online in the spring and summer. Every campus completed the academic year meeting virtually.

Shutting down for the quarantine allowed us to accomplish several important tasks for our ministry.

- 1. Buildings received much need updating and maintenance.
- 2. Staff received extra training in the area of digital communication including webx seminars, zoom meetings, and meeting rooms in FB groups.
- 3. We began to utilize these formats for reaching out to incoming freshmen earlier than ever by forming freshman meet and greet groups on zoom weekly.
- 4. The University campuses became more generous by giving us contact information for incoming freshman and relying on BCM staff to serve in an advisory capacity with the campus officials and meet crucial needs in the quarantine response period.
- 5. International student ministry has had an all-time high impact this summer, particularly at LSU. These students were stranded on campus without work visas or campus cafeterias. The BCM has been providing boxes of groceries, through donations, for around 90 families a week throughout the summer.
- 6. Emphasis had to move from large events to primarily Gospel appointments and Discipleship.

There are many more good things that came from this time of struggle.

This fall BCM staff and facilities will be utilized to continue to reach the University city all over our state. There are adaptation plans in effect at every campus and we will continue to strive to proclaim the gospel daily.

#### **COMMUNICATIONS TEAM**

#### DOING MORE

One of the goals for the Communications Team is to do more things for more people. This is more than a slogan for us. We desire to maximize our efforts to honor the Lord and serve you.

We meet with each strategist and review their events from the previous year and discuss their needs for the coming year. We drill down on ways we can better communicate with their desired audience and prayerfully, make them more effective.

#### What did this look like in 2019?

- Social media continues to be an effective tool to communicate with Louisiana Baptists. Facebook generated over 12.5 million impressions with an average daily reach of 24,995 people.
- LouisianaBaptists.org welcomed almost 268,000 visitors as mobile access continues to increase.
- Eighty-five print pieces were designed, printed and distributed to promote and support various events.
- Fifty-nine ads were designed for and printed in the Baptist Message.
- Over 40 promotional videos were created, and more than 60 additional videos were posted on Vimeo, our video storage site, for use during the events or on social media.
- Stacy Morgan joined the Communications Team in 2019. He conducted 18 roundtables with dozens of pastors to discover their needs relating to stewardship and Cooperative Program resources. There are now more than 150 resources available at LouisianaBaptists.org/stewardship.
- Coordinate, the Church Planning Guide, is produced by the Communications Team. Last year in excess of 4,500 copies were distributed to churches and Associations.

Here for You, Louisiana Baptists multi-media outreach strategy, launched statewide in February 2019 with the goal of seeding God's truth inside every heart and every home almost every day. Various platforms including TV, social media, digital streaming and billboards were used. We also partnered with the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association and their internet evangelism strategy. Here are some of the fruits of this effort:

- During the last two quarters of 2019, you seeded God's word inside 85% of TV households across the state an average of eight or more times during the weeks we aired. This is an across the market average.
- Social media/digital streaming reached an average of over 293,000 people monthly.
- The Graham partnership generated 4,346 views of the gospel presentation on *HereforYou.org* and 784 people indicated a decision for Christ!

What do these *Here for You* numbers mean? They indicate the seeds of God's truth were scattered in hearts and homes across the state. God promises that "some" of those seeds find good soil and the return on those seeds is 30, 60, up to 100 times more than what was scattered, (Matthew 13:3-9).

## EVANGELISM AND CHURCH GROWTH TEAM

Creating an Evangelistic Culture was the emphasis of the Evangelism Conference hosted by First, Lafayette. We were challenged and equipped to carry the Gospel near and far by our speakers. Next year's ECON will be January 25-26, 2021. Our host is Summer Grove, Shreveport.

Sean Keith is our Sunday School, Discipleship, and Revitalization Strategist. The ReGroup Conference and Associational Clinics reached over 1,000 participants, and helped equip pastors, staff, and lay leaders to reach their communities with the Gospel through small groups. Due to the global pandemic, this year ReGroup will be a digital experience, held August 10-11, 2020.

Our Adult Ministries and Church Administration Strategist is Jeff Ingram. He coordinated the Senior Adult portion of ECON 2020 with over 450 participants this year. In addition, Jeff hosted over 200 pastors/leaders for the annual January Bible Study and Doctrine Study previews. The work in Church Administration is mainly in consultations with churches/associations that cover the following areas: Pastor/Staff Salary Breakdowns; IRS Compliance; Best Practices for Church Finance Committees; Church/Associational By-Laws; Code of Ethics for Ministerial Staff; Church Staff Job Descriptions; and Sexual Harassment & Abuse.

Brandon Lewis serves as our Youth Strategist. The Youth Evangelism Celebration held at the Rapides Parish Coliseum, saw 6,000 youth and adults in attendance and many different spiritual decisions made during this powerful, two-day gathering. Unfortunately, camps for this summer had to be canceled. However, plans are already in place to make next summer a memorable time for students with the anticipation of many decisions made to follow the Lord.

Serving as your Children's Ministry Strategist is David Anderson. Just as our youth camps were cancelled, so were our children's camps and our Kid's Weekend of Worship. However, this year, there was strong attendance for the VBS training for LifeWay's VBS Curriculum. Pray for our churches because many had great plans and were not able to adjust to hold the most evangelistic event that they have during the summer. The Children's Ministry Retreat was another highlight of this strange year. Children's ministers gathered from around the state to encourage and challenge one another, as well as spend time being refreshed and renewed.

#### MISSIONS AND MINISTRY TEAM

John D. Hebert, Director

The Missions and Ministry Team of the Convention is committed to helping our churches reach their full potential in reaching our state for Christ. The team is led by John Hebert. Highlights for the year include a highly successful church planting effort, strides in our compassion ministry engagement with churches, and a growing mission builder program. These highlights accompany the execution of new strategies in Women's Missions and Ministry, Partnership Missions, Disaster Relief/Men's Ministry, and Mission Education.

James Jenkins, Director of Church Planting, continues to lead the effort of Church Planting. His team is comprised of Lane Corley, our Anglo-Church Planting and Replant Strategist, and Carlos Schmidt, Language Church Planting and Partnership Missions Strategist. Together with our churches and associations, these men have worked to meet the goal of the 2020 Presidential Commission to plant 300 new churches by the year 2020. By mid-year 2020, that number is now 262 or 87% of the goal. The spiritual fruit of these church plants totals 3,749 baptisms and 13,285 decisions for Christ since 2010.

Carlos Schmidt has continued to foster and affirm all the existing partnerships Louisiana Baptist churches and organizations have with missions' projects in the United States and the rest of the world. These partnerships include Haiti, Belarus, and Brazil. In addition, new partnerships in 2020 have been established with US Virgin Islands, Puerto Rico, Brownsville/Matamoros, Cape Bretton Island Canada, Yucatan Mexico, and Madrid. Carlos led Missions Ready Roundtables at Evangeline Baptist Association, Northshore Baptist Association, and New Orleans Baptist Association. Missions Ready Roundtables were scheduled in other associations but had to be canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Missions Ready Conference scheduled for May 2, 2020 also had to be canceled. Carlos has stayed closely connected with IMB, NAMB, and other agencies to keep Louisiana Baptist churches informed of any guidelines that need to be followed in view of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Carlos also had planned a VBS training mission trip to Madrid, Spain which had to be canceled.

With grateful hearts we increased our giving to the Georgia Barnette State Missions Offering in 2019. Even though giving is impacted by the pandemic that our nation is experiencing in 2020, we see continued faithfulness. Praying for, giving to, and being involved in missions are discipleship fundamentals and are a result of Bible study and mission's awareness. Assisting churches to explore new ways to involve women in Bible study and mission's discipleship is always the goal and purpose of Women's Missions & Ministry, led by Janie R. Wise.

Thank you, Louisiana Baptists, for giving to missions in the following ways in 2019:

Children's/Youth Mission Education Strategist, Jess Archer, reported that 432 campers, leaders, staff, and guests attended Children's Mission Camp 2019.

- 17 students made professions of faith in Christ and three rededicated their lives to Him in 2019 at camp.
- Since January 2020, she has spoken with eight new churches who were interested in starting Preschool, Children, and Youth WMU programs.

With spring and summer events canceled due to the pandemic, we are looking forward to a great fall of 2020 and 2021.

Jeffrey Cook leads efforts to engage Louisiana Baptist churches in Compassion Ministries. Many of our Louisiana Baptist churches are involved in some kind of Compassion Ministry. Jeff is assisted by a team of Association Compassion Missionaries (ACM) in several statewide associations. These workers are John Anderson, Deanna Corbett, Patrick Magee, Randy Osborn, and Pam Walker. Each ACM has hosted "Start Something" meetings to encourage area pastors and church leaders to start new works of Compassion Ministry. Additionally, the Compassion Ministry Team will provide training, utilizing the "Bridges out of Poverty" materials to help churches understand and assist those in systemic poverty throughout Louisiana.

In spite of the Covid-19 issues, Gibbie McMillan of Men's Ministries and Disaster Relief has been busy. Several tornadoes in the spring across Louisiana left two of our churches in need of repair. Marlow and Gravel Hill Baptist Churches in the Pitkin area needed help cleaning up the debris. In Lake Charles, 50,000 meals were prepared and distributed from Trinity Baptist Church to aide in serving the public with food during the response of Covid-19 pandemic. Tropical Storm Cristobal came ashore in Grand Isle in early June causing flooding in several areas along the coast due to storm surge. Over 100 clean up buckets were distributed through Bayou Baptist Association. Six trainings were held across the state. Our shower units are always in demand. Louisiana Baptists are still leading the charge when disasters happen.

This year our Disaster Relief team and volunteers have also been involved rebuilding St. Mathews Baptist Church, located at Pelican Point East Grand Bahama Island, which was destroyed during Hurricane Dorian. Louisiana and Mississippi state conventions joined together to rebuild this church. A grant was given by Southern Baptists through Baptist Global Response. We have hosted over 100 volunteers in this process. Another donor made it possible to be able to offer building material grants to the homeowners in the village of Pelican Point.

In other areas of Men's Ministries, Gibbie works with Royal Ambassadors through coordinating events like RA Congress and Missions Camp held at Tall Timbers Conference Center. Laymen like Hartie Spence, from FBC Lafayette, led in a similar effort by planning and coordinating Survivor Man Camp at ABC in Eunice. Mike Collie, layman from Temple in Ruston, coordinates Camp O Ree held at Camp Harris in Minden. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we were forced to cancel RA Congress and Missions Camp which is aimed at reaching RA's and GA's. Missions Education is a vital part in preparing our young men and women for the future of missions in Louisiana.

Mission Builder Strategist, Mike Shumock, has been engaged with churches and church plants throughout the year despite the difficulties of the pandemic. Louisiana Baptists have been involved in working on eleven projects.

#### PASTORAL LEADERSHIP TEAM

Dr. Steve Horn, Executive Director

The Pastoral Leadership Team serves churches of all sizes in many different ministries. Although the director's position remains unfilled, the work of this team has continued through the joint efforts of the state missions staff. This past year, we had 95 requests for resumes through our resume service. We have about 650 resumes on our server.

Granberry Counseling is a very important ministry to our pastors, staff, and ministers. This ministry is provided through your gifts to the Cooperative Program at no cost to our ministry staff. Thank you so much for your faithful giving.

Pastor search committee training remains an important task as we seek to serve our churches. We have a pastor search toolbox which can be found online to better equip a committee to find God's man for their church.

We partnered with our Directors of Missions in providing financial assistance through the Shepherd's fund. We dispersed \$13,155 in assistance in 2019.

Shepherd's Rest offers pastors and their churches a four-week sabbatical rest at no cost to the pastors or churches. In 2019, two pastors took advantage of this offering.

We are here to serve you and minister to you in any way we can.

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST MESSAGE

Our nation's shutdown and our state's stay-at-home mandate have been sobering with respect to their impact on household incomes, businesses' bottom lines and ministries' finances.

Likewise, the restrictions on gatherings have forced Louisiana Baptists to find creative ways to complete their missions.

With regard to finances, the Baptist Message saw an initial dramatic drop in revenue from all sources because of the governor's stay-at-home order.

- Advertising for 2020 was on a record pace for the third straight year, but shortly after the state's action, that revenue stream dried up to a trickle because so much was event related.
- Cooperative Program gifts had dropped by about seven percent.
- Subscription payments from churches and individuals had slowed.

Consequently, we suspended the printing of the *Baptist Message* until the financial strain on our churches and our members is eased in the state.

This was an unprecedented move, but it was not extreme action. It was a needed preemptory response to the circumstances in order to keep the *Baptist Message* viable and vibrant now and in the future.

Since then, Cooperative Program gifts have rebounded. But we suspended billing subscribers after the April 9 edition. Also, the restrictions on public gatherings continue to negatively impact ad revenue.

However, without the costs related to printing and mailing, and by being mindful of expenses, we have managed to keep our operating account on solid footing.

Moreover, the Small Business Administration approved our request for a CARES Act loan (grant) equal to two-and-a-half months of payroll. Now, we are in the process of obtaining forgiveness for this loan.

In summary, taking the preemptive action of suspending the print edition means that the *Baptist Message* will be on solid footing as we prepare to return to normal operations.

In that regard, the plan is to return to printing the paper one month after the shelter-in-place restrictions are lifted, and the economy is up and running again. We will start with one paper edition the first month back, as well as one edition the next month. Afterward, we plan to return to a twice-amonth printing schedule.

Just as local congregations turned toward social media during these times in order to maintain a ministry presence in their communities, so has the *Baptist Message* relied on the Internet during this time we suspended printing the newspaper.

The *Baptist Message* already had been making a number of improvements with regard to making it easier to navigate our website, but also in expanding the content to include broader news coverage and information services.

This made it easier to shift our focus to our online operations, using the *Baptist Message* website to publish the news as it happens, and using Facebook and Twitter to alert our readers to reports, articles and features -- as well as to push our news beyond our website.

The vital importance of the *Baptist Message* social media ministry has been especially evident during the coronavirus outbreak on two bases.

- We have been sharing information about the extraordinary efforts our churches have made to
  overcome the obstacles in presenting the Gospel during this time of social distancing, and the
  news we broke about these innovations have inspired other news services, secular and
  religious, to do follow-on stories about Louisiana Baptists.
- Importantly, the *Baptist Message* played a critical role in alerting our churches and evangelists about the developing opportunities offered through the CARES Act to nonprofits. Using our contacts in government and sharing information as it emerged from these sources, we were ahead of the curve in preparing Louisiana Baptists to take advantage of the Payroll Protection Program loans even sharing a link to the application form only minutes after it was distributed to the Small Business Administration's D.C. office.

With news of multiple vaccines in development, we expect to resume printing of the *Baptist Message* within 60-90 days.

Meanwhile, we urge you to visit <u>www.BaptistMessage.com</u> to stay informed and be equipped to fully participate in the cooperative ministries and missions that define our fellowship of churches at the local, state and national levels.

Finally, know that we remain committed to being the voice of Louisiana Baptists, sharing the news of our individual and combined efforts to spread the Gospel in our state and to the world.

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

Dr. Jeffery Steed, Executive Director

The Louisiana Baptist Foundation was chartered as a non-profit agency of the Louisiana Baptist Convention in 1944 for the purpose of encouraging and assisting with gifts to the churches, institutions and entities of the LBC and the Southern Baptist Convention. A total of 14 Trustees govern the LBF with 12 elected by the Convention, along with the Convention Executive Director and the Convention President serving ex-officio. The LBF receives approximately 26% of its operational funding from the Cooperative Program with the remainder primarily provided through fee-based income on assets under management.

The Foundation is in its 76<sup>th</sup> year of service in 2020 with new leadership. With the retirement of Wayne Taylor, Dr. Jeffrey Steed took the helm as Executive Director on April 1, 2020.

Ministries can receive gifts through a variety of methods including charitable gift annuities, bequests, donor advised funds, charitable remainder trusts and pass-through stock donations. In addition to assisting with gifts supporting the churches and agencies of the LBC and SBC, the Foundation also provides investment management and trust administration services for churches, institutions and ministries of Louisiana Baptists. Baptist churches and institutions benefit from using the Short-Term Fund for cash reserves and designated accounts.

#### Highlights from 2019 include:

- Distributions or reinvestments of \$5,269,895 were made in 2019. The total market value of assets managed at December 31, 2019 was \$162,999,666.
- Over 400 Louisiana Baptist churches, agencies and institutions had nearly \$44 million on deposit in the Foundation's Short-Term Fund (STF) at December 31, 2019. Learn more about the STF and its benefits at www.LBFinfo.org.
- Gifts, bequests and trusts received by the Louisiana Baptist Foundation for the support of Christian ministry totaled \$2,510,784 in 2019. Every gift is designed to Advance the Kingdom! Some examples are highlighted below:
  - -- The Foundation accepted gifts creating several new endowments in 2019 totaling \$1.23 million. These endowments will pay income to a variety of ministries including local missions and global missions.
  - --Multiple donors established their Last Will and Testament that included a gift to a Baptist ministry important to them. In the future, as these donors step into Heaven, these Testaments will direct gifts to Louisiana Baptist churches, Louisiana Baptist Children's Home, a Baptist camp and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary.

- --The Foundation completed estate successions and is working on others that will provide well over a million dollars to Baptist ministries. The LBF staff can assist you with an estate plan that benefits your family and will Advance the Kingdom beyond your lifetime.
- In 2019, the LBF received \$217,211 from the Cooperative Program and the LBF distributed \$4,793,853 to Baptist ministries in return. Over the history of the Foundation, the Cooperative Program has invested \$10.3 million while over \$139.7 million has been distributed or reinvested for Baptist causes!

#### LOUISIANA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME AND FAMILY MINISTRIES

Dr. Perry Hancock, President and CEO

In its 120<sup>th</sup> year of ministry Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries continued its mission of providing love, care, and hope in Christ for children and families in need. The Children's Home provided a positive Christian witness through its residential child and family care programs, foster care and adoption ministries, Granberry Counseling Centers, Christian Women's Job Corp, Compassion for Kids, and Orphans Embrace.

In 2019 the Children's Home provided ministry services for over 2,200 children, families, and individuals. Through its on-campus and off-campus residential programs, 196 children and 35 mothers were served. An additional 54 families received placement referral services. The Granberry Counseling Centers staff provided professional Christian counseling for 930 individuals during the year. Through its Minister Care program, a partnership with the Pastoral Leadership division of LBC, Granberry provided counseling for 51 Louisiana Baptist minister families.

Christian Women's Job Corp provided educational and job skills training for 74 women and support services for 25 women in 2019. The ministry maintained its adult education certification with the state of Louisiana and had 7 graduates. Through its partnership with Women's Missionary Union and its World Crafts ministry, 3 CWJC students served as artisans, producing over 1,000 Christian products.

Through a growing community care ministry, Compassion for Kids, the Children's Home served over 900 economically challenged children and family members in northeast Louisiana. Compassion for Kids provides life essentials and the message of Christ, meeting both physical and spiritual needs. Projects are conducted in partnership with local LBC churches.

In 2019 the Children's Home also shared God's love in word and deed through its international orphan care ministry, Orphans Embrace. The children's residential village in Haiti was opened and 17 children were accepted as residents of the village.

On campus, a second family care cottage was completed. The facility provides housing for four families who are served through the HomePlace ministry. Construction of a third family care cottage will begin soon. Work on a new recreation complex began in 2019. The facility will include a gymnasium and a pool. Construction should be completed in early 2021.

Louisiana churches once again provided support for the Children's Home through the Annual Children's Home Sunday Offering. The offering meets many of the critical needs the children have during the year. Churches also continued to support children and families at the Home through the Fall Food Roundup which provides all of the non-perishable foods needed for the entire year. In the summer, churches from across Louisiana donated their VBS offerings to support the children. Many churches provided additional assistance in various ways throughout the year and God used LBC Cooperative Program giving from the churches to share His love with those in need.

As a result of the support from our churches and the witness provided by the various ministries of the Home, many children and others experienced the joy of salvation in Christ and received real hope for life and life eternal. Thank you Louisiana Baptists for meeting needs and changing lives through your Louisiana Baptist Children's Home and Family Ministries.

#### LOUISIANA COLLEGE

Dr. Rick Brewer, President

Louisiana College is a Christ-centered community committed to Academic Excellence where students are equipped for Lives of Learning, Leading, and Serving. This is the mission of Louisiana College.

During the last five years, my leadership team and I have worked to restructure, reorganize and find ways to improve the efficiency of how Louisiana College functions, to better deliver services to our students and the community, but also to be the best steward. This year was unlike any other, yet God has shown his favor amidst the storm.

#### COVID-19

Louisiana College, like all colleges and universities, has faced unprecedented challenges this spring due to the COVID-19 pandemic, including making the heart-wrenching decision to cancel our annual commencement exercises, after first postponing them until August. With the revived massive upswing in cases in the state, we believe the best decision for the health and safety of our graduates, their family, and LC personnel was to host a virtual ceremony during the scheduled ceremony time. It was live streamed so all graduates and their loved ones could attend. Photographs of each graduate were featured as their names were read, and while we would not share the momentous occasion in person, we all celebrated with our graduating Wildcats. All the graduates of December 2019 and May 2020 have also been invited to participate in the May 2021 ceremony.

Although the leadership at LC has worked diligently since March to create the best response possible to the pandemic and be proactive for students to return this fall, much uncertainty remains about the upcoming school year. We promise to continue to seek God's will and listen intently to governmental and medical experts and do our part in keeping our entire college community as safe as possible.

Still, we have much to be thankful for and have received many blessings throughout the 2019-20 academic year to share with you. Please accept our continued appreciation for your economic and spiritual support.

#### **Faith Integration**

This year evangelism seminars designed equip staff and coaches with principles for integrating the Christian faith into college life were led by Vice President for Advancement Dr. Jerry Pipes and Dr. Keith Manuel, evangelism/church growth director for the Louisiana Baptist Convention.

Chapel speakers led our students, faculty and staff through the Book of I Peter, and BCM Director Thomas Worsham organized weekly student-led small groups to study a master/teacher booklet on I Peter written by faculty. BCM mission projects this year included ministry at the Bridge Church in Covington and the CENLA Food Bank in Alexandria. It also provided funds to support the LBC's E4 Preaching Conference at First Baptist Church in Pineville.

In the fall, our annual Christ, Church, and Culture (C3) Conference "Evangelizing Millennials" discussed the timely issue "What is the Real Issue with Social Justice?"

Fall and spring Campus Awakenings were hosted by the Jenkins Center for Evangelism and Missions. Dr. Don Wilton, pastor of First Baptist Church in Spartanburg, South Carolina led the fall revival, and Dr. John Fream, pastor of Cypress Baptist Church in Louisiana led the spring revival.

Dr. Rick Brewer was keynote speaker at the annual CENLA March for Life. The largest march in the state of Louisiana includes thousands of campus and community members march from LC to downtown Alexandria in support of life.

#### Grants

College students today face very different technological needs than their parents' generation. The increased demands on their attention and seismic cultural shifts that have occurred in the last few years call for a university campus that can accommodate today's needs without sacrificing integrity and rigor.

We can see God's hand in so many of the grants and opportunities that have come our way this year.

Louisiana College was blessed to be awarded a \$2.2 million Title III grant to improve and expand online education from the U.S. Department of Education. This has allowed for the creation of a Faculty Development Center with support personnel, including a director of online education and an instructional designer. It could not have come at a more important time, with all instruction having to abruptly move online in March due to the coronavirus.

The grant, the largest in LC history, allows us to go to the state-of-the-art learning platform, Canvas, to deliver premiere online content. In addition, we are moving to a cloud environment that allows the Enterprise Resource Planning System to conduct routine business.

Perhaps more relevant at the moment, though, is that this grant allowed us to hire Dr. Natalie Maxey as an engineering professor, in a new pre-engineering program. This, in turn, led us to partnering in a 3+2 engineering degree with Louisiana Tech University. This led to a generous donation from Jim and Mary Terrell of \$100,000 for the equipment to offer a first-year engineering course at LC. This equipment, specifically a 3-D printer, allowed Dr. Maxey to step in and create personal protective equipment (PPE) to protect medical personnel and first responders in the fight against COVID-19. Blue Cross Blue Shield, in turn, gave LC a \$5,000 a grant to continue this work, and we have raised more than \$20,000 to defray expenses and purchase three additional 3D printers to produce PPE for area medical facilities. LC has produced more than 3,000 items for medical care workers and facilities around the state, and requests continue for equipment. God has allowed LC to use science and technology to minister to our community in a very rewarding way.

We were also blessed to receive several other grants this year.

- Louisiana Board of Regents awarded LC \$87,330 department enhancement grant to renovate classrooms in Guinn Auditorium.
- The Rapides Foundation awarded LC an \$111,200 Healthy Behaviors Program Grant to increase access to health and fitness opportunities for the greater Pineville area, including rehabilitating the Parrish Fuller Fitness Trail.
- Homeland Security Grant of \$100,000 was awarded for additional surveillance cameras and lighting on campus.

#### **Enrollment and Retention**

Our retention rate from fall 2019 to spring 2020 was 88 percent. Student enrollment at the college has grown 15 percent since 2015.

We increased the number of CENLA high schools participating in District Rally this year from 21 to 28. LC also hosted the Future Business Leaders of America Leadership Conference and general conference with more than 375 high school students attending.

A three-week recruitment trip to Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia, the Philippines, and Taiwan was held in partnership with Haven of Hope Academy in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and schools in Southeast Asia.

The Louisiana Board of Regents approved the college to offer dual enrollment courses, and DE courses were provided for Tioga High School in the fall and spring.

#### **Academic and Athletic Programs**

We have partnered with CHRISTUS St. Frances Hospital to establish the Cabrini Scholars program to provide economic support for students in our Accelerated Bachelor of Nursing (ABSN) program. These are adult students returning to college to pursue a second degree in nursing, and these grant of \$5,000 or \$10,000 come with a promise of full-time employment as a registered nurse upon graduation. This is an innovative track to nursing and Cabrini Scholars is an innovative way to assist these dedicated students in paying for it.

LC produces top-notch nurses, and we are grateful for the support of Cabrini to allow us to produce many more. Our ABSN licensure exam passage rate for recent graduates of the college's nursing program is 100 percent.

The Louisiana College Athletic Department formally applied for admission to the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) this summer. This decision received the unanimous support from the College's Board of Trustees. LC was previously part of NAIA in the 1970s-1990s and experienced several conference and regional title play during those years. This will allow us to play against schools in our region. Perhaps the biggest reason that NAIA is a good fit, though, is its Champions of Character initiative and five core values of integrity, respect, responsibility, sportsmanship and servant leadership, which lend itself to LC's own core mission as well as many other faith-based institutions. Our student athletes reached a significant milestone this year. The student-athlete 2019-2020 aggregate GPA was 3.004, a goal set in our 2016-2020 Strategic Plan. We believe NAIA membership will only help bolster this with its focus not only on integrity but also on academic success.

#### Advancement

Total gifts to LC were in excess of \$5 million for the fiscal year. These include gifts from 195 Board of Visitors members, whose gifts total \$231,000, in addition to several substantial restricted and unrestricted gifts from alumni and other individual donors.

#### Refurbishment

During the past year, significant renovations have been done in the residence halls. Phase I of the renovations began summer 2019 and included a \$3.7 million upgrade to Tudor Hall and \$1.9 million to English Village. Summer 2020 upgrades include Cottingham and Church Halls. Eighty percent of residence halls will have been refurbished by August 7, 2020.

Other improvements done this year include the replacement of the air handler in Cavanaugh Hall and replacing the upper roof of H.O. West Gymnasium.

**Resource Development** 

We want to express our gratitude to the churches of the LBC for support through the Cooperative Program. This support allows LC to maintain an affordable and accessible education for students who sincerely desire a Christian education. It would not be possible without your continued support, and we are continuously grateful.


